Artists Copy 1	In one of the first recorded instances of intellectual property litigation in history, which artist brought a lawsuit against the Italian Marcantonio Raimondi in the first decade of the 16th century? Raimondi had copied the artist's woodcut series of engravings called the Life of the Virgin. The courts eventually ruled that Raimondi's only violation was to include the artist's iconic monogram, and that continued copying was permissible once the distinctive monogram was removed. Fun with Flags 2	As mentioned on Fun with Flags in the Big Bang Theory tv show, during the 1936 Summer Olympics in Berlin a European country discovered that it was using the same flag as the civil flag of Haiti. Roman Emperors 1	The Roman conquest of Britain was effectively begun in AD 43 under which emperor? He was the first Roman Emperor to be born outside Italy.	CLAUDIUS

Roman Emperors 3	Claudius was succeeded in AD 54 by his step-son Nero. Which actor, known for his bubbly personality, played the role of Nero in the classic 1976 BBC series "I, Claudius"?	Christopher BIGGINS
The Sky at Night 1	Seen in the Southern Hemisphere, below Orion, which constellation is the only one named after a terrestrial feature. It is the second most southerly of all the constellations, and is named for a geographical feature in South Africa.	MENSA (Table Mt.)
The Sky at Night 2	What name – after a German physicist – is given to the radius of a collapsing celestial object at which gravitational forces require an escape velocity that exceeds the velocity of light, resulting in a black hole?	SCHWARZSCHILD radius
